Back in History - SILVER ISLET



Today

When settlers first saw Silver Islet, they were greeted by some of the most barren landscape that many of them had ever seen. Little did they realise the riches that lay just below the surface. It was in 1868 that silver was first found on the island by Thomas McFarland during a routine survey and in less than a year, the first mineshaft had been dug. It wasn't long however before miners realised that the real job wasn't finding the silver, it was keeping the mine dry. The island lay just above the lake and a breakwater had to be built to keep the waters back and even then, mining could only be done in calm weather and only if the pumps were kept running. The weather wasn't the only hardship that miners faced.



Diphtheria and other such ailments were often more of a danger than the accidents that happened down in the mine. In all, 79 miners

and their families were buried at the cemetery located on the island. In 1870, more cabins were built to house the growing number of people and by that same year the settlement had added a store, a hotel and even a jail to its single street, which was simply called The Avenue. In 1885, the mine had closed, partially due to the falling silver prices and the constant delays in the shipments of coal needed to keep the pumps operating. When the mine finally shut down most of the miners left, leaving the settlement a ghost town. During Silver Islet's 14 years of operation, more than 3 million dollars worth of silver had been mined and although several attempts were made to open the mine again, none were successful. The island today hasn't changed much since it was first settled over a hundred years ago and while the miners and their families may be gone, their story is one more chapter in Thunder Bay's past.





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

Back in History - EDWARD PETERSON/ FLYING FORTRESS OF FORT WILLIAM

16 years before Charles Lindburgh flew his plane across the Atlantic Ocean, a local pioneer made his own flight of fancy and in doing so, secured himself a spot in the pages of local aviation history. Edward Peterson, a local businessman, began work on his plane around 1910. By 1911, he was ready to make the first of many flights. In fact, his single-wing plane may have been the earliest of its kind in Canada. His first successful flight occurred that summer when he flew his plane over Island Two at a height of 30 to 50 feet. This was only the first of many flights by Peterson but within a year, the plane crashed and the Flying Fortress of Fort William never flew again. While Peterson may have been the area's first flying enthusiast, he certainly wasn't the last. Around 1928, five ex-airforce veterans met to form the town's first flying club. In the fall of that year, ground was cleared to make way for Bishop Field, named after Canada's World War One ace, Billy Bishop. The earliest planes to use the new field were a pair of bi-winged Gypsy Moths. Over the years, the Fort William Aero Club continued to grow and by the Second World War it had become so large and well organised that it was assigned the task of training pilots for the Royal Canadian Air Force at its new field at the new municipal airport. While flying has come a long way since days when early pioneers literally flew by the seat of their pants, the role that they played in the history of aviation in Thunder Bay can still be seen today.







TRAVEL - AUTOMOBILE

DRIVER'S LICENCE - A valid licence from

any country is valid in Ontario for 3 months.
SEAT BELTS - The law in Ontario requires the driver and passengers to wear seat belts if the vehicle is equipped with them.

SPEED LIMITS - On highways and expressways, 90 km/h (55 mph) or as posted; in urban and built up areas it's usually 50 km/h (30 mph).

METRIC CONVERSION - All mileage and speed limit signs in Ontario are in metric (kilometres). The kilometre is equal to five eighths (5/8) of a mile. To convert miles to kilometres simply multiply the miles by 1.6, eg. 100 miles equals $100 \times 1.6 = 160$ km. Conversely, to convert kilometres to miles, multiply the number of kilometres by .6, eg. 100 km equals $100 \times .6 = 60$ miles.


AUTO CLUBS - The Ontario Motor League is affiliated with the AAA. The membership card from your local AAA branch entitles you to all the benefits of the OML.



