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
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MILLS BLOCK FOREST

Mills Block Forest is a 284 hectare forest that offers a 4 km hiking trail. Walk across an active beaver dam and watch for wildlife in the rich mixed forest. It is the location of the Lakehead Region Conservation Authority's annual Fall Mushroom Hike.

Mills Block Forest is an extremely popular area for hiking/dog-walking. We urge all pet owners to keep your dogs on-leash at all-times while visiting, and that it is the pet-owner's responsibility to clean up after their pet.

DIRECTIONS: Mills Block Forest is located at the corner of John Street Road and Community Hall Road. Follow John Street Road west for about 5.3 km. Mills Block Forest will be on the left. *Located within the City of Thunder Bay.*



THE GHOSTS OF SILVER ISLET

On a sunlit autumn day the winding drive onto Sibley Peninsula is nothing short of spiritual. Surrounded by golden sienna forest, big blue sky overhead, venturing out to the Sleeping Giant this time of year is glorious. Occasionally the keen eyes of wild animals and birds take note of your passage as, innocently enough, you make your way to Thunder Cape. But be forewarned. In October, out here even on the sunniest of days shadows lengthen early. Dusk flies fast. And after nightfall...well, it can be cold as the grave.

I'd first felt the eerie vibe of Silver Islet in summertime: a whispering energy just beyond one's normal sense of hearing. A row of curiously constructed wooden houses perched like unwelcoming birds on a wire, except in this case the wire was a dusty main avenue of sorts. These silent dwellings were best passed slowly, carefully; and not because of the condition of the gravel road.

Some years later, again I was there in daylight, but in early winter. The same whispering energy; spooky stillness. I was drawn to the General Store near the edge of the frozen inlet: a large rather sinister-looking building looming up darkly from the snow midst those shadows I mentioned. I felt particularly uneasy because of its small boarded-up windows: like eyes that couldn't see out. What might the inside of this abandoned building look like now? Had all the beams and upper floors simply decayed into heaps of rubble? Maybe it was completely empty, swept clean of anything but the occasional creak of a shifting

foundation. Imagining energy trapped inside such a space with no daylight sent prickles up my spine. A steep wooden staircase along one of the outer walls beckoned; I ignored the "No Trespassing" sign; ascended as far as I dared. At certain spots I tried to peer through narrow cracks in the lumber, couldn't see a thing. Pitch-black. There was a smell of old, old water. Unexpectedly I heard a rustling noise; it seemed to originate from a ground-level corner of the space, but I couldn't be sure.

Then, distinctly, I heard the slow muted whap-whap of wings, gaged the giant wingspan by the sound. Instincts screeching, I jerked back, nearly lost my footing as I clutched the railing. It took about twenty minutes, I don't know, of gulping in fresh winter air before the shaking stopped; and I could descend. But not before, from this vantage, looking outward, I noticed a bright circle of silver just at the periphery of my gaze.

waters. They, too, were demolished by storms, ice surges, even a freak tidal wave. Finally, a breakwater of rock and concrete was built that allowed miners to extract silver ore worth \$3 million. In 1883, mining operations ceased for lack of fuel for the furnaces and water filled the shafts." Submitted by: Henry Chenoweth

James Cawdor: apparently his ghost remains trapped in a mineshaft. Prolific Thunder Bay author Bill MacDonald has a wonderfully spooky essay on what really happened to him. A word of advice: if you're alone for the read, be sure to leave a light on after you retire for the night.

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

Extending the life of farmers' market finds

Farmers' markets are a popular destination for shoppers looking to eat healthy, locally sourced food.

Sometimes, however, the lure of the bounty is greater than the time and effort needed to actually prepare what's been purchased.

For those times when you have more produce than you know what to do with, follow these tips on extending the life of fresh foods to enjoy the harvest in the months to come. With a full pantry, home chefs will feast on fall flavours long after the leaves have fallen.

Store produce properly. It's hard to resist locally grown fruits, but an excited buyer may find fruit rotting before they have time to eat it all. Excess moisture, contact with water and an imbalance of oxygen and carbon dioxide all contribute to food spoilage. To reduce waste, look for quality containers like Rubbermaid FreshWorks food storage system, which is designed to create and maintain the ideal environment

to help keep produce fresher up to 80 per cent longer than regular packaging.

Start jamming. A well-made jam brings a touch of sweetness — and a delicious reminder of summer — to the cold, winter months. Whether you use jam in your favourite cookie recipe or as the filling of a layered cake, don't be afraid to try new flavour combinations of fruit. Use whatever has been languishing in your fridge before it goes bad. Think cranberry and pear, peach marmalade, or whiskey and spiced apple and plum.

Get in a pickle. Take inspiration from international cultures and their different styles of pickled vegetables, from Korean kimchi to Middle Eastern turnips. A simple base of vinegar and salt can be enhanced with herbs, chilies and aromatics like garlic to bring out more complex flavours in a pickle brine. The tangy crunch of pickled cauliflower makes a great addition to winter salads, while spicy pickled beans add zing to Caesar cocktails at your next holiday party.


MT. MCKAY SCENIC LOOKOUT

Thunder Mountain was the original name for Mount McKay. Here, traditional native gatherings were held on this sacred ground. Prior to the development of road access to the lookout only traditional native people were allowed access to the grounds, which is considered a nesting area for the Anemki or Thunderbird. A large white cross has been placed on a mountain ledge to commemorate Indian people who have served our country in time of war.







CUSTOMS REGULATIONS

If you're an American citizen returning to the U.S., and if you've been in Canada more than 48 hours and have declared nothing in the last 30 days, you can take back \$800 (U.S.) worth of merchandise per person, duty free. TRAVEL - AUTOMOBILE

DRIVER'S LICENCE - A valid licence from any country is valid in Ontario for 3 months. **SEAT BELTS** - The law in Ontario requires the driver and passengers to wear seat belts if the vehicle is equipped with them.

SPEED LIMITS - On highways and expressways, 90 km/h (55 mph) or as posted; in urban and built up areas it's usually 50 km/h (30 mph).

METRIC CONVERSION - All mileage and speed limit signs in Ontario are in metric (kilometres). The kilometre is equal to five eighths (5/8) of a mile. To convert miles to kilometres simply multiply the miles by 1.6, eg. 100 miles equals $100 \times 1.6 = 160$ km.

Conversely, to convert kilometres to miles, multiply the number of kilometres by .6, eg. 100 km equals $100 \times .6 = 60$ miles.

AUTO CLUBS - The Ontario Motor League is affiliated with the AAA. The membership card from your local AAA branch entitles you to all the benefits of the OML.

ACCIDENTS - If you are involved in an accident resulting in a personal injury or property damage over \$1,000 you must notify the police and remain at the scene of the accident until cleared by investigating officers.





